ON May 12th, a King and Queen are to be crowned. Ceremonies will be performed which go back to the remote past. Ointment will be poured on the royal head, prayers repeated.

Tens of thousands will stand for hours to watch the royal pair drive past. There will be shouting and waving of flags. Excitement, rising to hysteria, will fill the air. Few will stop to consider what it is all about. They will just be carried away. The restraints of everyday life will vanish for the time being. The whole of England will be in carnival. Trains, buses, all the modern means of transport, will swell the crowds beyond anything yet seen. Newspapers and broadcasting will help to unite a whole people in common activity.

If the ceremony were taking place among an African tribe, it would be a wonderful day for an explorer to observe the customs of the natives and to learn about the working of their minds. But in England, too, we can observe such things. We need to know more about how people behave in crowds and masses. For mass excitement can be a very worse use than others.

MASS OBSERVATION

In 1937 Mass Observation called for people from all parts of the UK to record everything they did from when they woke up in the morning to when they went to sleep at night on 12th May. This was the day of George VI's Coronation. The resulting diaries provide a wonderful glimpse into the everyday lives of people across Britain, and have become an invaluable resource for those researching countless aspects of the era.

The Mass Observation Archive repeats this call on 12th May each year. The diaries we receive will be stored in the Archive alongside the 1937 documents. May 12th is likely to be quite an ordinary day, but for those researching, the 'ordinary' can often provide extraordinary results. Therefore, we would be very grateful if you could document your May 12th for the future.

Write as much as you can about what you do, who you meet, what you talk about, what you eat and drink, the places you visit, the people you meet, the things you read, see and hear around you and of course what you yourself think.


